### Operations Corner

I hope everyone is enjoying the great weather we've had over the last month. Hopefully the fair weather will continue as we head into the colder season.

The new heat pumps have been installed and are now operational. There is one in the Main Lounge and one at each end of the back hallway. These should help keep the heat and humidity in check in the summer months, as well as helping with heating these areas in the cooler months.

The new bathing system has been installed and is now in use in Barrachois. There were a few hiccups that we had to deal with after the installation, but it now appears to be functioning as it should.

The roofing repairs in the Courtyard area are now complete, the crew had good weather during the 2 weeks it took to complete this job, which helped a lot. The Courtyard is available once again to any Residents who choose to use it, at least for the time being.

The exterior doors in the original section of the building are being replaced in the coming weeks. The existing ones are wooden and quite drafty. The new ones will be insulated steel doors and will have proper egress hardware and weather stripping which will be less drafty.



We also purchased a new auto-scrubber for Frances to use in Lynwood. It has a smaller scrub pad for use in tighter spaces such as washrooms and bedrooms, and is easier to maneuver.

The Park and other outdoor spaces will be closing soon, be sure to get out and enjoy them if you can. Whenever we start getting freezing temperatures these spaces will have to be closed for safety reasons for the winter months.

# Nurses Nook

Our FLU clinics are well underway!
Our Residents 65 years and over have received a high dose Flu vaccine, while our Residents 64 years and under will receive the regular dose Flu vaccine.

If you have not yet had your **FLU** shot, get it soon...the best part – it's **FREE**!!!

One of the most high risk groups for complications (i.e. pneumonia/hospitalization and death) from the flu are those over 65 living in long term care. That covers the majority of people living here.

**Remember**: if you have any cold/flu symptoms, please do not visit until your symptoms subside. When you do visit, there are hand sanitizers for your use at every entrance.

Please do your part and make use of these as you enter and leave the building to help us prevent illness in our home.

## Eat Well. Be Well

#### Lasagna Soup

1 ½ cups of pasta sauce (you can buy one from the store, but I always make my own with a can of crushed tomatoes and lots of spices!)

2 cups vegetable broth

1/4 cup dried lentils

2 cups chopped vegetables of choice (I use whatever I have on hand, but some of my favorite things to add include carrots, mushrooms, peppers, and kale)

4-5 lasagna noodles, broken up

Combine all ingredients in a pot and simmer until pasta and lentils are cooked and soup has thickened (about 20 minutes)

It's great on its own, but is made even better with a dollop of ricotta cheese added when serving

This recipe is one of my biggest staples through the fall and winter. I find it so comforting to curl up with a bowl of soup when its cold out. It's one of the easiest meals to make and is perfect for when you don't want to cook after work. I hope you enjoy!
